
MEET OUR ALUMNUS OF THE MONTH



Tino Thomas

Tino Thomas joined Loyola School as a kindergartener in 1981 and completed SSLC in 1993. He did his B. Sc. in Forestry in Kerala Agricultural University Thrissur and MBA in the National Institute of Agricultural Business Management, Hyderabad. He is currently with Al Mana Group in Dubai as the Head of Projects for the Middle East Region. Al Mana is a retail conglomerate with over 1000 stores in the GCC with sports, lifestyle, luxury, fashion, jewelry, fragrance, and flower divisions.

Tino is an outstanding badminton player. He represented the United Arab Emirates at the World Senior Badminton Championship in 2023 held in Jeonju, Korea. His stellar performance has earned him a place among the Top 16 players worldwide in the Men's Doubles 45 Category. In ISC Abu Dhabi UAE 2023 Open, Tino emerged as

the Men's Doubles 45 Winner.
Additionally, at the India Club UAE
Open 2023, he secured the 3rd place
in the Men's Doubles 45 Plus category.
At the GCC Bahrain Badminton
Tournament, he clinched victory in
the Men's Doubles A Category. Tino's
success story also includes the Shuttle
Time Dubai Club Championship in
2020, where he stood out as the Men's
Doubles winner.

In India, he represented two universities over three years at both State and University levels. During his Loyola days, he was the national roller skating champion in 1982, 1983, and 1986, excelling in figure and pair skating. His dominance continued at the State level, where he held the championship in roller skating for an impressive eight years.

Tino belongs to a sporting family. His brother Zeno, who graduated from Loyola in 1997, was a State level athlete and a ranked table tennis player. Their father, P.C. Thomas, who was the former national coach of the Indian basketball team and the international referee officiating at the Asian Games in 1982, did yeoman service to

Loyola School during the 1980s and 90s as a coach and mentor. Tino's mother is also an accomplished badminton player in her own right. The Thomas family's connection to Loyola School is not just a testament to individual achievements but also to shared commitment to sports development at the grassroots level.

Tino's wife, Teena, is an excellent badminton player. She represented India in 2017 in Women Doubles 35, donned the national colours of the UAE in 2019 and 2023 in Women Doubles at the World Senior Badminton Championship. Their sons, Nevin and Noel, are also accomplished badminton players.



A Day of Fun and Learning

We had a field trip to the Karyavattom campus of University of Kerala on 1 February 2024. It was a great day of fun and learning. Our first destination was the Department of Zoology where we had the chance to see and learn about different animals and the exciting research happening there.

We entered a room which had an impressive collection of insects and marine creatures showing us how amazing and vast the animal world can be. We saw stingrays, starfish, pufferfish, seahorses, octopuses, crabs, saltfish, corals, sole fish, jellyfish, squids, sea shells, many insects, millipedes, lizards and a lot more. The room was alive with the wonders of nature. Also, we learned something interesting about zebrafish! They can actually grow back their tails if they get cut.



We saw some microscopes kept in the Zoology Department, where scientists study about small creatures. We also got a chance to look through the microscopes to see a hydra. These powerful instruments, with adjustable magnification like 10X, 40X and 100X at the top and bottom, allowed us to see the minute details of a hydra. The department was really busy with all sorts of research activities, and we were so lucky to see some of the ongoing projects, including the study of preserved butterflies.

After leaving the Zoology department, we walked through a dense mini-forest that felt endless. This type of forest is known as the Miyawaki model, named after Japanese botanist Akira Miyawaki. After that, we saw many greenhouses where we saw many kinds of plants, all different and unique. There were even ponds with plants growing in the water, making it feel like a mini jungle inside!

Then, we proceeded through a narrow walkway through which we re-entered the campus and proceeded to the Archaeology Department.

At the Archaeology Department, we saw so many things from a long time ago. Most of them were excavated from the Kachchh district, Gujarat. We saw some antiques from the Harappan civilization such as old pots, stones, bangles, sculptures, iron sickles, and seals. A replica of a Harappan house, complete with a well, allowed us to visualize the living conditions of ancient civilizations. The stone artefacts displayed there helped us learn more about the tools and things people used in their daily lives a long time ago.

The Zooarchaeology laboratory, a unique feature of University of Kerala, showcased complete skeletons of various mammals, birds, reptiles, fish, and some shells. Our exploration extended to a museum with dinosaur bones, heads, and teeth.







In a dedicated lab, we learned about different methods used for the preparation of bones and skeletons. The person in charge told us how they separate flesh from bones. There are two ways they do it. First, by boiling it and second by burying it for a long time. If they use the first method, the bone becomes white, and with the second method, it becomes brownish. It was cool to learn how they take care of bones!

The Department of Aquatic Biology and Fisheries was next, showcasing a collection of fish from rivers, lakes, and oceans. Some of them are shaped weirdly and are really interesting. We saw the ways to conserve and protect them, from the tiny baby fishes to the big ones.

We are grateful for the thoughtful planning done by our friend Hari Govind's parents, Dr. Sreejith P. and Dr. Sreeranjini. They organized the entire visit, and their presence made









the trip even more special. Student volunteers also helped and guided us, making the educational experience feel personalized. The hospitality they showed us was truly amazing and made the day extraordinary.

It was an awesome day of learning and exploring. We are so grateful for the chance to go on this trip, and we are excited about an opportunity like this in the coming academic years.

Tentative Judgement Criteria for **Students' Personal Magazine 2024-2025**

Students' Personal Magazine has been a landmark initiative at Loyola School. And the response to it has been absolutely stupendous. The best part of it has been that most students put their heart and soul into preparing their magazines; it has never been a half-hearted ritualistic approach of the sort that some lazy students have towards assignments. The result is that they could concretize their amorphous ideas and largely unexplored artistry into a little volume which they are sure to keep closest to their heart forever. Considering the overwhelming response to the idea of a personal magazine, we are glad to publish the tentative judgement criteria for next year.

Personal Magazine: Award Criteria

Total Marks: 100 (Maximum 40 marks for the form and 60 marks for the content) **Form:**

- ♦ Magazines of fewer than 10 pages (excluding the cover) need not be considered for award. (To be reckoned a page, it must have a minimum of five lines of text, or 15 words, or at least one picture/drawing/graphic element on it.)
- ♦ Cover design: Maximum 10 marks
- ♦ Maximum 2 marks for the *Title* page. (It must have the title/name of the magazine as well as the name and class of the student). No marks if the magazine does not have a title page.
- ♦ Maximum 2 marks for the *Contents* page. No marks if there is no such page.
- ♦ Maximum 2 marks for the Acknowledgement, if any.
- ♦ Maximum 5 marks for the Introduction/Editorial


- ♦ Maximum 1 mark for correct *Pagination*. No marks if the pages are not numbered.
- ♦ Maximum 5 marks for design consistency (page margins/ borders/other design elements)
- ♦ Other things being equal, maximum 5 bonus marks for elegant manuscript magazine (Word-processed magazines do not qualify for the bonus mark.)
- ♦ Hand-drawn/digitally generated images have an edge over images downloaded from the Internet.

Content

- ♦ General Principle: We appreciate originality and variety. Aarticles with a personal touch (like the writer's experience on the campus or during an excursion, or some function at school, or some incidents at home or in life etc.) are better than highly derivative articles like 'The Bermuda Triangle'.
- ♦ Maximum 10 marks for an article/poem/artwork
- ♦ Since most articles are in English, 5 bonus marks will be awarded for each additional language if the content in that language runs to at least one page. Acceptable additional languages Malayalam and Hindi.
- ♦ 5 bonus marks for each additional genre of writing explored in the magazine. (Clarification: If all articles are travelogues, only one genre is used, so no bonus mark is given. If there is a short story also (or a poem, or a critical essay etc. for that matter) more genres are used and each one of them qualifies for bonus marks.)
- ♦ 5 bonus marks for illustrations appropriate to the content of the article. As regards the illustrations, hand-drawn or digitally generated graphics are preferable to images downloaded from the Internet.
- ♦ 5 bonus marks for a travelogue if it uses two-thirds of the space for giving a feel of the place visited or the experience during the journey. The pictures included in it must have some human element in it. (Clarification: The photo of the excursion party against the backdrop of Mysore Palace is preferable to a photo of the majestically illuminated Mysore Palace available on the Internet.)
- ♦ No merit for plagiarized riddles and jokes
- ♦ No merit for strings of quotations strung together under whatever heads because they are all available on the Internet.

As for the content, weightage is given to original stuff, even if it has a few mistakes in it, not to derivative material in immaculate language. After all, a personal magazine is not an exercise in copying and pasting.


