Those who were born in the 1960s or before are most likely to be familiar with the movie **Kummatty**, a masterpiece from the acclaimed Malayali moviemaker, G. Aravindan. However, hardly anybody is likely to know the connection between the movie and Loyola school. That's for a bit later.

The movie, released in 1979, won the Kerala State Film Award for the Best Children's Film. In 2022 the movie was restored by The Film Foundation, the US-based non-profit organization founded by Martin Scorsese and several other leading filmmakers in 1990 for the preservation and exhibition of restored and classic cinema. Here is what Martin Scorsese said about **Kummatty**: "I'm thrilled to be working...to preserve and restore director Aravindan Govindan's extraordinary film, '**Kummatty**'. Aravindan was a visionary director and '**Kummatty**' is considered among his greatest works. The Film Foundation's World Cinema Project will share this film with the wider audience it deserves, making it a true cinematic discovery."


Recently, the movie soared to new heights when it was screened at the

Academy Museum of Motion Pictures in Los Angeles on March 14, 2025. The Academy is the body which hands out the Oscars every year and boasts a membership including eminent film personalities from around the world.

Now back to the Loyola connection. The lead child role of Chindan in the movie is played by a Loyolite of the 1984 batch, Ashok Unnikrishnan. The shooting kept him away from school for one month. He was in the Class 7 at that time.

Kummatty or the bogeyman, who is a sorcerer and oracle, lives a nomadic life and encounters a group of children in a village in Kerala and captivates them with his magic. The movie has minimal dialogue but is peppered with folk songs like the famous rain song *karukarakarmukil*.

As the time comes for him to leave, **Kummatty** decides to give the children a magical experience as a parting gift. He transforms them into various animal forms. Chindan takes the form of a dog. He is chased away by another dog, so he is not around when the other children are given their human form back by **Kummatty**. So he has to wait for a year till **Kummatty** returns and over that period Chindan feels the real pain of bondage.




