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


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
# GANDHI JAYANTHI QUIZ COMPETITION Peace Club







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# LOYOLITES REACH FOR THE STARS: A Transformative Educational Tour to the USA

A delegation of 50 students, teachers, and parents from Loyola School successfully completed a ten-day, (8 to 18 October) meticulously planned educational tour of the USA, coordinated by Go4Guru under the leadership of Mr. Kayamboo Ramalingam. The journey, deeply encouraged by the school management, delivered a rich blend of profound educational sessions and cultural immersion across New York and Orlando.

The ambitious tour began with a transatlantic journey from Trivandrum to New York via Dubai, with the team settling in at Baymont by Wyndham, New Jersey, for the first and second night. The first full day in the USA offered a powerful cultural immersion in New York City, featuring visits to two of America's most iconic landmarks, the Statue of Liberty, symbolising freedom and hope, and the dazzling, vibrant energy of Times Square.

The transition to Orlando on the third day involved an early morning flight. Upon arrival and check-in at the Holiday Inn, the students received a warm welcome from Mr. Kayamboo, CEO of Go4Guru, before enjoying a light shopping experience and a delightful buffet dinner.

The centrepiece of the tour was the visit to the Kennedy Space Centre (KSC) in Orlando, an experience that plunged the delegation into the heart of scientific discovery and human achievement.

The day was anchored by an extraordinary interactive session with astronaut Dr. Norman Thagard, a pioneer renowned as the first American to travel to space aboard a Russian spacecraft. Dr. Thagard shared profound insights into the rigours and rewards of space travel, emphasising the courage, perseverance, and boundless spirit of exploration. His words, encouraging students to "think beyond boundaries and believe that with courage and perseverance, even the sky is not the limit," resonated deeply. As a lasting, personal memento, each student received a certificate personally signed by Dr. Thagard.

The team was also treated to a thrilling Simulated Launch Experience, where they realistically felt the vibrations, sounds, and G-forces of a Space Shuttle launch. This immersive experience offered a direct, visceral lesson in the incredible forces and precision involved in rocketry.

The educational immersion continued as the team explored the following extensive Kennedy Space Centre exhibits, witnessing the scale and history of the American space program: the Apollo/Saturn V Centre, where students walked beneath a massive, real Saturn V rocket, illustrating the monumental effort of the moon-shot era; the Space Shuttle Atlantis Exhibit, allowing up-close viewing of the orbiter; a captivating IMAX movie on the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST), which provided a spectacular visual journey across galaxies, distant stars, and nebulae, deepening their astronomical understanding.

Every exhibit powerfully underscored the immense teamwork, creativity, and dedication that drive NASA's missions.

The day was unequivocally declared much more than an educational trip. It was a journey of imagination, inspiration, and discovery. The following days broadened the tour's scope, integrating lessons in media, engineering, commerce, and higher education.

The Loyolites spent an unforgettable fourth day at the Universal Studios, Orlando, exploring how advanced robotics, sound engineering, 3D animation, and set design converge to create movie magic. Attractions inspired by Hollywood blockbusters served as a live classroom, illustrating the seamless integration of storytelling and technology.

The fifth day was dedicated to adventure and bonding at Disney's Water Theme Park. Beyond the thrills, the students observed how art, engineering, safety, and organization merge to create an extraordinary large-scale recreational experience. Leisure time, including visit to Walmart in the evening, provided first-hand exposure to American retail culture.


Day six was marked by an inspiring visit to the prestigious University of Central Florida (UCF). The campus tour offered an insightful glimpse into academic excellence, research culture, and the dynamic learning environment of a leading US university, awakening many dreams and aspirations among the young students. The group also had an exceptional experience of shopping at the Premium mall and a buffet at CICI Pizza.

The seventh day saw the team, check out from Holiday Inn as early as 1.00 a.m. and return to New York City for a poignant conclusion. The day's exploration included the Twin Tower Memorial, a silent and moving tribute emphasising the values of peace, courage, and resilience, Wall Street, where the towering skyscrapers and the iconic Charging Bull offered a glimpse into global commerce.

Despite the challenges of heavy evening traffic, we reached the JFK airport on time for check in. Throughout the return journey the students remained cheerful sharing with one another personal experiences that truly inspired their minds, strengthened bonds, and created memories for a lifetime. The successful and enriching educational tour stands as a testament to Loyola School's commitment to nurturing students, grounded in learning, creativity, and global exposure.

The tour's success was made possible by the guidance of Fr. Ramlat Thomas SJ, the Principal of CBSE section, the accompanying parents, including Mr. Nizamudheen, Dr. Arun, Mr. Rony, Dr. Ambika, Mrs. Chickoo, Mrs. Lakshmi, Dr. Zainab, and Mrs. Atulya, alongside several supportive parents.

When I close my eyes and revisit our thrilling educational tour to the USA, the memories come alive with a special resonance. For me, as the only girl among boys and ever supportive Joy Sir and Fr. Ramlat, every moment glows with a distinct vibe, a blend of strength, courage, curiosity, and gentle pride in standing out.

Our adventure kicked off at Trivandrum International Airport with parents' proud goodbyes. The first inkling that my experience would be different came when my mom, squeezing my hand, whispered that I represented all the dreams of girls traveling far and wide. At every checkpoint, from security to luggage checks, I felt both watched over and quietly cheered on by our whole group.

During our stopovers at Dubai International Airport and then the long Emirates flight, being the only girl brought its own set of small challenges and silent triumphs. Sometimes I was lovingly fussed over by kind air hostesses, making sure I felt comfortable. My friends in 11th grade supported me a lot and made me comfortable. Their friendship is something I will cherish forever in my life. These moments, though subtle, reminded me that my voice and comfort mattered, and I was often the quiet balance amidst the group's energetic bustle.

Landing at JFK and Baymont by Wyndham, NJ, jet-lagged and wideeyed, I encountered the joyful chaos of room allotments, group meetings. Here, I often noticed how being the only girl meant representing more than myself; I stood, in small ways, for every girl who dreamed of adventure, resilience, and new cultures. The boys looked to me as a sister, sometimes protective, sometimes just respectfully giving me space. I felt like a living reminder that travel, learning, and laughter are not limited by gender.

Whether riding the Statue of Liberty ferry or running through the crowds of Times Square, I experienced a whole lot of adventure and fun. The Statue of Liberty used to be a masterpiece I always wanted to see in real life.

It was with awe that I gazed at the statue. I really enjoyed visiting Universal Studios, where we experienced 3–4 different mysterious and exciting rides. They thrilled us so much that we wanted to explore the rest of the park as well, but unfortunately we couldn't because of time constraints.

We visited the Kennedy Space Centre, Orlando for 2 days. It was truly an inspiring visit since we met an astronaut and got to interact with him. We also got to witness several 3D shows on space shuttles, moon exploration, Mars exploration, etc. There were 3D simulators where we all had a pretty exciting time having real life exploration into deep space. It instilled a spirit of interest in all of us to have a thirst towards knowing deep into what 'space' is all about.

At places like NASA or Universal Studios, I sometimes noticed people's surprise at seeing a girl in a large group of boys, but my participation subtly challenged any unspoken stereotypes, showing that girls belong everywhere, in museums, thrill rides, waterparks, and even debates about which snacks to buy for the bus.

Throughout the journey, I reflected on what it meant to travel, speak up, and be independent as a girl. At times, I felt the responsibility to set an example, reminding myself and others that gender should never limit one's dreams or experiences. My male peers became close friends and thoughtful travel companions; our differences enriched our experience and helped everyone, myself included, grow in respect and understanding for each other. At times, I learned to assert my space, needs, and boundaries with kindness but confidence.

Standing in the drizzle at the University of Central Florida, taking in the campus with all its diversity and hope, I realised that my journey had also transformed my own views on leadership, courage, and gender roles.

As we landed back in Trivandrum, I held tightly to the lesson that inclusion is a two-way street; my group cheered for me, respected me, and learned from me, just as I did from them.

I hope every girl reading this feels empowered to travel, explore, and represent her dreams without hesitation. This journey wasn't just mine; it was everyone's, and I am forever grateful for the love, laughter, and newfound confidence it gave me.

Kennedy delivered the iconic speech declaring, 'We choose to go to the Moon, not because it is easy, but because it is hard.' This speech stirred up most of the youth and the scientists to discover more and make America one of the superpowers in the twenty-first century. The snippet of this was displayed in the main gallery of the KSC - VC

The Space Shuttle stood as yet another marvel of human ingenuity. No one would ever have thought a rocket would go up to space and land like an airplane. I was stunned by the way they demonstrated the construction, in-flight simulation, and landing. These memories are etched in the hearts of each of us.

KSC's simulations are yet another breath-taking experience. The way they add to the perfection is commendable. We would feel like we are literally in the rocket. Each communication, lightings, visual effects, and even the minute thing were done to its perfection that we will be engrossed into the environment. KSC makes us feel how the astronauts felt when they were in the rocket. Kennedy Space Centre gifted me not just models and theories, but a history of past and experiences.

The Loyola school NASA tour took place from the 8th to the 18th of October. During this tour, we visited many places, tasted new food, and experienced unfamiliar climatic conditions. But what I liked the most was the visit to the Kennedy Space Centre in Orlando, Florida, which lasted for two days.

We arrived at KSC on the 11th of October 2025, where we were greeted by a fleet of enormous rockets used for NASA's previous space missions. We first visited a memorial hall at KSC where we watched a presentation on astronauts' inspirations and explored a Hall of Fame, called 'Heroes and Legends', dedicated to all the astronauts who played a crucial role in the progress of NASA's space program. We then toured a Mars exploration museum before returning to the hotel.

We were then taken to a room where we were briefed about the Apollo missions through a presentation. The next room showcased the original control room used for the Apollo 8 mission. We experienced the emotions going through the minds of the astronauts and the people behind the mission.

We also saw the rocket which was used for the mission, and the suits used by the astronauts. The next bus took us to the memorial of the Atlantis Space Shuttle. The Atlantis Space Shuttle was a result of a decade of hard work from NASA's scientists. We were shown the original space shuttle and the amount of effort NASA's scientists put into making it. We also experienced a simulator replicating a mission inside Atlantis.

Our visit to the Kennedy Space Centre was nothing short of an incredible experience, leaving us with lasting memories and a deeper appreciation for space exploration.



### THE LADY WHO ENLIGHTENED MY JOURNEY

My recent visit to New York became truly memorable because of one majestic monument, the Statue of Liberty. Standing tall and radiant on Liberty Island, is not just a statue, but a living symbol of freedom, hope, and friendship that continues to inspire millions around the world.

As the ferry sailed through the glistening waters of New York Harbour, the chilly wind brushed my face. The Manhattan skyline slowly faded behind, and there she stood ahead, tall, graceful, and glowing in the golden sunlight. My heart skipped a beat. The closer we moved, the larger she grew, her green figure rising proudly from the island, her torch held high as if lighting the way for every dreamer who arrives on these shores. In that moment, I knew my entire visit to New York was worth it, just to witness this lady of light.

She holds a torch of enlightenment in her right hand and a tablet in her left, inscribed with 4 July 1776, the date of America's independence. The broken chains at her feet speak of liberation from oppression. Even her seven-pointed crown symbolises the spread of freedom across the seven continents. Truly, the Statue of Liberty is not just made of copper and iron; she is crafted from courage, unity, and the human spirit.

Centuries ago, America was under British rule. Thirteen colonies stretched along the Atlantic coast, taxed heavily and ruled without representation. By 1775, the colonies rose in rebellion, and after a long, bitter struggle, led by men like George Washington, the United States won its independence in 1783. Across the ocean, in France, thinkers and reformers watched closely. Among them was Édouard René de Laboulaye, a professor and historian who deeply admired America's ideals of liberty.

In 1865, when America abolished slavery and proved that freedom was not just a word but a living principle, Laboulaye was moved to the core. To him, this moment showed that the nation that had once fought for independence was now ready to extend liberty to all its people.

This strengthened his belief that America deserved a monument honouring such progress. That very year, during a warm gathering with friends, he voiced an idea that would echo through history: "If a monument should rise in America as a memorial to her independence, it would be only natural if it were built by the united efforts of both nations."

Among the guests was a young sculptor, Frédéric Auguste Bartholdi, whose imagination caught fire. He envisioned a woman holding a torch high, a symbol of hope to guide humanity toward freedom. Yet at that time, France was under Emperor Napoleon III, and the word liberty was dangerous. Laboulaye and Bartholdi kept their dream alive quietly, disguising it as a gesture of friendship toward America.

When the emperor fell in 1870 and France became a republic again, their secret dream finally found its wings. Bartholdi sailed to America in 1871, seeking the perfect home for this grand lady. As his ship entered New York Harbour, he spotted a small island called Bedloe's Island, now known as Liberty Island, right at the gateway to the nation. "This is it," he exclaimed. "She must rise here to greet all who enter."

France took on the task of building the statue, while America agreed to construct its pedestal. In France, Gustave Eiffel, who would later design the Eiffel Tower, built a strong iron framework to hold the statue's form. Skilled artisans hammered copper sheets by hand to create the flowing robes and serene face of the Lady. Across the ocean, Americans struggled to raise funds for the pedestal. Money was scarce, but hearts were generous. Newspapers urged citizens to help, and publisher Joseph Pulitzer promised to print the name of every donor, no matter how small. Children sent pennies; workers sent their day's wages.

The money that flowed from ordinary people, from the children of France and America alike, showed how deeply this dream had touched their souls. It was not just a monument being built; it was humanity itself, joining hands across oceans to honour the spirit of liberty.

By 1884, the statue stood complete in France, over 150 feet tall. She was carefully taken apart into 350 pieces, packed into 214 crates, and shipped to America aboard the French vessel Isère. When she arrived in 1885, the people of New York erupted in joy. A year later, on October 28, 1886, the Statue of Liberty was unveiled before thousands of cheering citizens. Cannons thundered, bands played, and hearts swelled with pride. Though Laboulaye had passed away before seeing his dream fulfilled, his vision now stood alive, glowing through Bartholdi's masterpiece.

Over the years, the statue's copper surface turned a gentle green, a patina gifted by time itself. Today, she continues to stand proudly, her torch shining like an eternal promise to the world.

As I stood before her, gazing up at her calm face and radiant flame, I felt humbled. She seemed alive, whispering that freedom is not a gift to be received once, but a flame that must be protected forever. When the ferry sailed back toward Manhattan, she slowly grew smaller against the sky, yet the feeling she left in me grew larger. I realised that New York's greatest treasure wasn't its skyscrapers or lights, it was this timeless lady, reminding humanity that liberty, once lit, must never be allowed to fade.


The session also featured real-life examples and a video presentation that illustrated how small acts of kindness can make a meaningful difference in society.

## MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS PROGRAMME Peace Club


