In Loving Memory of James Thomas (1951–2025)

It is with profound sorrow that we bid farewell to James Thomas Sir, a beacon of wisdom, dedication, and unwavering integrity, who departed this world on 27 September, 2025. Born on March 21, 1951, in the serene town of Adoor, to the late Jacob Thomas and Rosamma Thomas, James sir hailed from Thekkemury house in Vilakkumadam near Pala. As the eldest of a loving family of eight—three brothers and five sisters—he was a pillar of strength and affection, nurturing bonds that defined his warm and devoted household. He leaves behind his beloved wife, Rosamma, and their cherished daughters, Jisha and Anu, who were the pride and joy of his life.

James Sir's journey was a testament to the transformative power of education and selfless service. From his humble beginnings in the classrooms of Govt LP School in Anakkal, Kanjirappally, where he completed his lower primary education up to Class 4, to his upper primary years at CCM HSS in Karikkattoor, Manimala, and high school at St. Thomas Higher Secondary School in Erumely, his academic foundation was solid. He pursued a Pre-Degree at St. Dominic's College, Kanjirappally, and excelled at SB College, Changanacherry, earning his BA and MA degrees, securing the second rank in his MA programme.

His professional odyssey was marked by profound contributions to English education. He began as Head of the English Department at Tuensang College in Nagaland, bringing passion and precision to his role. This was followed by a distinguished 28-year tenure as a professor at St. Joseph's College, Devagiri, Calicut, where he inspired countless students with his mastery of language and literature. Even after retirement, his commitment never waned; he joined Loyola School in Sreekaryam as Academic Coordinator, pouring his heart into shaping young minds until his final days.

Our acquaintance began in 1999 at St. Joseph's College, Devagiri, evolving into a deep friendship that transcended the teacher-student bond. I recall a cherished scooter ride together—a rare privilege, as he seldom allowed others to ride—symbolising the trust and warmth he extended. As an exceptional English teacher, he imparted not just grammar and prose, but life lessons in humility and excellence. Post-retirement, his generosity continued; he shared meticulously prepared grammar lessons and materials, correcting my writings, including my doctoral thesis. His edits were unparalleled, offering insights that propelled me to success. James Sir was more than a teacher—he was a mentor, a father figure, and a genuine friend, embodying authenticity in a world often marred by pretence.

In his final days, following an angioplasty, James's spirit shone brightest. From his hospital room, he expressed a heartfelt desire to see me, urging prayers for his recovery. Visiting him alongside fellow fathers, we shared words of comfort, prayed together, and exchanged a poignant embrace—a kiss on the hands, a hug that sealed the sacred bond between teacher and student. It remains the greatest gift we could share, a moment of pure, unadulterated love and respect.

James Sir lived for his school and community, available around the clock, never uttering "no" to any task, yet insisting on perfection. He abhorred shallowness, mediocrity, and hypocrisy, living as a committed soul akin to a Jesuit outside the Society of Jesus—devoted, principled, and profoundly human. His life echoes the words of Henry Adams: "A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his influence stops." Indeed, his influence rippled far, moulding generations with his sharp intellect and compassionate heart.

As we mourn his loss, let us celebrate his legacy: a man who turned education into an art of empowerment. In the spirit of Rabindranath Tagore, "The highest education is that which does not merely give us information but makes our life in harmony with all existence"—James exemplified this harmony, inspiring us to strive for excellence without compromise. He leaves behind a world brighter for his presence, reminding us that true greatness lies in quiet, steadfast service.

Rest in peace, dear Sir. Your lessons endure in our hearts forever, cherished by your loving wife, Rosamma, daughters Jisha and Anu, your devoted siblings from the warm and tight-knit Thekkemury family, your loving Loyola family members, and all who were touched by your remarkable life.

He wholeheartedly offered reference books for our perusal, for added information. He never stopped learning and we were encouraged watching him learn.

I was never ashamed to seek help from James Sir for correction. On the contrary, I was proud to be guided by such a great person who always persevered to attain perfection. His corrections were gentle, detailed, and satiating.

Music, a passion that I shared with Sir, was often discussed. I admired him for the knowledge he possessed on that. He was always generous in sharing the music score for piano and guitar recitals especially for my sons.

Even after I retired from service, James Sir continued to answer my queries via email. The replies would be very clear, descriptive, beneficial, and prompt. There was one last query, probably still in his inbox, for which I have not received his reply. I know that I will never receive his reply ever again but I'll follow his advice to take up challenges, face them and find solutions; for James Sir never encouraged giving up.

Dear James Sir, you were God's good and faithful servant and son who provided protection to those who came seeking that, and you have borne rich fruit which has nourished generations of children and adults alike.

Captain of Our Hearts - A Tribute to James Sir

A nervous yet seemingly confident young woman entered a classroom full of examiners, ready to deliver the demo class that would decide her future at Loyola School. She had chosen and carefully prepared a lesson plan on Robert Browning's poetry. As she spoke, she could feel the weight of many eyes upon her, but one presence stood out. A tall, white-haired man was sitting quietly, observing intently, his wise eyes fixed on her with a mixture of curiosity and discernment. When he finally spoke, his gruff voice carried both authority and respect. It was the kind of voice that could silence a room, yet never diminished the one it addressed. The young woman soon found herself engaged in a spirited exchange on Victorian literature. That conversation marked the beginning of a bond that would leave a deep impression on her life.

James Sir, had not simply spoken to me. From that moment onward, he had taken me under his tutelage. I was not merely a colleague; I became his student, his "beti", his beloved daughter. Though my time with him was short - a meagre three years - it was rich beyond measure. He taught me to look at literature and life with nuance and uncompromising clarity. Our conversations extended beyond classrooms, traversing the worlds of Thomas Hardy and James Joyce, through music, landscapes of Assam, and into searching questions of faith and doubt. He sharpened my intellect even as he nurtured my spirit.

To the wider Loyola community, James sir, was a formidable force to reckon with; a strict disciplinarian, an uncompromising perfectionist, well-known for his pedantic precision with language that could intimidate even the most self-assured. He was a man of principle, with a no-nonsense approach and steadfast commitment to the welfare of the school. In every sense, he was an institution. Yet behind the stern façade was great depth and humanity. He once advised me, "Dear girl, our sufferings are best preserved as our personal property, to be shared only with the most trustworthy souls." These words revealed to me a man who not only bore his burdens with dignity but who was capable of deep trust and intimacy. He would have scorned the idea of my writing a sentimental homage to him, chastising me for being an emotional fool, but I cannot help it. To be counted among those few whom he trusted with his inner world was both an honour and a responsibility. My admiration for him and the time we shared demand to be remembered.

In his final days, the universe allowed me a small, precious glimpse of him. I had promised him tea, parippuvadas, and long conversations once he recovered and returned to school. That promise will remain unfulfilled. Yet to partake in those last moments is a gift that I will carry in my heart. His passing feels unreasonably soon. I will no longer see him standing in front of the ICSE building, arms folded behind his back in deep contemplation. He will not be there to gently pat my son, Michael's head while calmly humouring his long list of questions. We will not get the chance to celebrate my PhD together, a dream he cherished more deeply than I did. But in the quiet spaces of my memory, he will endure as a father figure, a mentor, and a companion in thought. In the shadow of his absence, I can't help but echo the words of Walt Whitman:

"O Captain! my Captain! Our fearful trip is done,

The ship has weather'd every rack, the prize we sought is won."

Indeed, the prize of his wisdom, integrity, and care will continue to shine in all of us who were privileged to know him and learn from him.

His command of the English language was beyond compare. He had a solution for every issue we faced. Never one to panic or lose his cool, he carried a beatific smile etched on his face. He never said "no" and was a stickler for schedules. Not many know the tremendous load that James Sir carried for Loyola. I am certain he did not take much rest or many breaks. He worked late into the nights, and his responses to queries were always instant. A designer, editor, and writer par excellence, he painstakingly compiled the school's history; an extraordinary work that only he could have accomplished.

I will miss him deeply, as will the school, LOBA, and all those fortunate enough to know or work with him. His popularity was evident from the large turnout that came to bid him a final goodbye, both at Trivandrum and at Pala, where he was finally laid to rest. LOBA offers its prayers and condolences to his family.

Unfortunately, I was out of Kerala when he left us and was unable to pay my last respects in person. That broke my heart. However, it was providential that I happened to be in Trivandrum soon after, on the very day the school held a condolence meeting in his memory, where I was able to eulogize a dear friend.

I offer my personal condolences to the bereaved family. He leaves behind his wife, Mrs. Rosamma, and his two daughters, Jisha and Anu, whom I have never met. I must, however, assure them that in James Sir they had a wonderful and much-valued husband, father, and head of the family; a man of character, wisdom, and honesty. Beyond his academic rigor, James Sir's presence was felt in the very hallways of our school. He would often walk through the corridors, hands held behind his back, moving softly and quietly, almost like a silent sentinel. That one episode moved me and changed my perception about many things- including the man with whom I had the chat and maybe, even life as a whole.

Months later, I was on my way to the school bus when I was called from behind. It was the very same man and this time he had something in mind. He spoke to me about honesty and how he believed that I was "an honest person". Since sarcasm was not his forte, I enjoyed his words with a hearty laugh. In the end, he asked me to pen down an article for the esteemed School magazine 'The Loyolite'. I was told to take as much time as I wanted but to keep one small thing in mind: originality. It was one thing he felt that was missing these days: words that came from the heart. Today, as I take my pen to jot down something even for the littlest of matters, this is one thing I still keep in mind, even as I reminisce about my memories of him.

For me, James Sir was not just a disciplinarian: he was also a teacher, and as a matter of fact, I've been privileged to attend one of his classes. A few months ago, he handed me a script that I had to present before him. Having done quite a few voice-overs, I presumed this could be done in a breeze. But as I finished reading the script, he handed me another one, which was hand written and contained all the pronunciation mistakes I had made in the past one minute. This was when I was introduced to the man whose knowledge of grammar and pronunciation crossed all the horizons I knew, initiating a class that I truly keep close to my heart.

I see James Sir not just as a guardian, not just as a teacher, but as a fellow Loyolite who loved the school as much as any of us- if not more. With his hands held behind, he would roam around the school with sternness, strictness, and a sense of boldness. His strictness did not command fear, his sternness was not unwelcoming, and his boldness was not overpowering but it was in fact, his way of showing love.
